Bible Reading Genesis 32:22-31

Early word

In her book *Scarred By Struggle, Transformed By Hope*, the Benedictine nun and writer Joan Chittister uses the Jacob story as a paradigm for a "spirituality of struggle." In Jacob's story she identifies eight elements of our human struggle - change, isolation, darkness, fear, powerlessness, vulnerability, exhaustion, and scarring. But with each human struggle there is a corresponding divine gift - conversion, independence, faith, courage, surrender, limitations, endurance, and transformation. "Jacob does what all of us must do, if, in the end, we too are to become true. He

confronts in himself the things that are wounding him, admits his limitations, accepts his situation, rejoins the world, and moves on." The end result of the nocturnal struggle for Jacob, the cheater and liar, was God's blessing: "God blessed Jacob there" (32:29).

The Spirituality of Struggle:

Change..... Conversion
Isolation.....Independence
Darkness.....Faith
Fear.....Courage
Powerlessness.....Surrender
Vulnerability.....Limitations
Exhaustion.....Endurance
Scarring.... Transformation

Meditation on wrestling and blessing.

Let us reflect on the story of Jacob's wrestling and the insights of Joan Chittister. As an aid to reflection, in a spirit of prayer, use the string to tie knots, representing points of struggle in our lives. And, where there is blessing, a little loop to represent the space blessing creates in our lives for new possibilities. Or use the music and the images to invite God into our hearts to wrestle and bless.

Offering

At this time, you may also choose to surrender the knot that may have troubled you. As you offer it with your gifts of money, be assured of the indwelling gift of blessing you will receive.

Leader: In our offering, I invite you to bring forward your monetary offering to the front, and to remain standing, holding your piece of string, in a circle around the table. Please leave your Orders of Service in the pews. When we have all gathered, I invite you to share with a person alongside you, and that person respond by sharing with you, one insight that came to you during the reflection on wrestling and blessing. When you have each finished sharing, tie the ends of your strings together. Then repeat by turning to your neighbour on the other side, each share your insights, and tie the ends together. We should end up with a complete circle of string!

The Paul Kelly music is played softly (on repeat) as people come forward and engage in the sharing and string-tying and until everyone has returned to their seats.

When the string-tying is complete, the liturgist proclaims:

Leader: We are a people of God, tied together in our individual and communal struggles.

We are a pilgrim people, sharing a journey together toward a promised end.
God, bless the monetary offerings we have made, the gift we are to each other as we connect together in the name of Christ, and the hope this church may be in this city.

Let us leave the circle of string on the floor around the table and return to our seats.

The circle of string is left on the floor around the table and people move back to their seats. The music is faded out when everyone is back in their seats.

Prayers for others

Let us join in prayer on this day of remembrance for Hiroshima, and all that Hiroshima represents, to recall the past, to be challenged in the present and to seek hope for the future.

O God of power, gracious in love, you have given humankind responsibility to care for all the earth. But we have put our faith in military power, while you call us to build a community of trust and love.

By our actions and by our inaction, and by our participation in the systems of society we often become agents of violence and destruction.

O God of us all, let Hiroshima become for us a symbol of hope that nuclear weapons will never again be used to kill and destroy.

Let us remember Hiroshima as a beacon to commit ourselves to find ways to live together in peace, that we may not be just peace lovers, but peacemakers.

O God of infinite possibility, transform our hearts and minds and give us courage to use our skills and technology to transform weapons that destroy into all that upholds life.

Isaiah said: "It shall come to pass that the peoples shall beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks.

We pray for the time when "Nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore."
