THE PRAYERS OF WHO WE ARE

The spiritual path is not about us trying to prove to God that we are worthy of love. The spiritual path is about remembering that we are already worthy of love. The spiritual path is about unlearning everything that suggests we are not already worthy of love. We bear the image of the Divine (Genesis 1). What's deepest and most true about us is that we are good. What's deepest in a human being is the Divine image. Sure, humanity makes a mess of things (Genesis 3) but the

story doesn't begin with the mess. The story doesn't begin with the way we mess things up and make mistakes. Your story, my story, begins with who we are at our deepest. That which is deepest and most true about us is goodness. We continue to make a mess of things but that doesn't change or diminish our worthiness and goodness. We have forgotten who we are at our truest and deepest. Spiritual practices are acts of remembering. The greatest gift we can give another is to be a mirror where they can see a reflection of their own goodness. You are not a problem to be solved, fixed, improved or overcome. You are a person worthy of love. You can be both a mess and a person whose truest and deepest truth is goodness. Be yourself today. You are beautiful that way.
